this book demonstrates how dryden made virgil s aeneid available in an english idiom that would reflect and appeal to english tastes and values over a long period of time

fitzgerald s translation is so decisively the best modern aeneid that it is unthinkable that anyone will want to use any other version for a long time to come new york review of books virgil s great epic transforms the homeric tradition into a triumphal statement of the roman civilizing mission translated by robert fitzgerald

an anthology of 43 classic essays and poems on the roman poet quinn s position is that his work continues to be compelling and flexible enough to support a wide range of interpretations and perspectives in addition to a bibliography she provides a lengthy introduction and conclusion that tackle the question of the book s title why vergil further she juxtaposes the first few lines of the aeneid in its original latin with five translations and includes a synopsis of it and a list of dates for quick reference she has not indexed the volume

the arts of rule cover the exercise of power by princes and popular sovereigns but they range beyond the domain of government itself extending to civil associations political parties and religious institutions making full use of political philosophy from a range of backgrounds this festschrift for harvey mansfield recognizes that although the arts of rule are comprehensive the best government is a limited one

throughout her career pulitzer prize winning poet maxine kumin has been at the vanguard of discussions about feminism and sexism the state of poetry and our place in the natural world the roots of things gathers into one volume her best essays on the issues that have been closest to her throughout her storied career divided into sections on taking root poets and poetry and country living these pieces reveal kumin honing her views within a variety of forms including speeches critical essays and introductions of other writers work whether she is recollecting scenes from her childhood ruminating on the ups and downs of what she calls pobiz for poetry business describing the battles she's fought on behalf of women or illuminating the lives of animals kumin offers insight that can only be born of long and closely observed experience

this is the first volume to offer a critical overview of the long and complicated history of translations of virgil from the early modern period to the present day transcending traditional studies of single translations or particular national traditions in isolation to offer an insightful comparative perspective the twenty nine essays in the collection cover numerous european languages from english french and german to greek irish italian norwegian slovenian and spanish but also look well beyond europe to include discussion of brazilian chinese esperanto russian and turkish translations of virgil while the opening two contributions lay down a broad theoretical and comparative framework the majority conduct comparisons within a particular language and combine detailed case studies with in depth contextualization and theoretical background showing how the translations discussed are embedded in their own cultures and historical moments the final two essays are written from the perspective of contemporary translators closing out the volume with a profound assessment not only of the influence exerted by the major roman poet on later literature but also why translation of a canonical author such as virgil matters not only as a national and transnational cultural phenomenon but as a personal engagement with a literature of enduring power and relevance

how is it that i seem to be this margaret fuller the pioneering feminist journalist and political revolutionary asked herself as a child what does it mean filled with new

insights into the causes and consequences of fuller's lifelong psychic conflict this biography chronicles the journey of an american romantic pilgrim as she wanders from new england into the larger world and then back home under circumstances that fuller herself likened to those of both the prodigal child of the bible and oedipus of greek mythology meg mcgavran murray discusses fuller's puritan ancestry her life as the precocious child of a preoccupied grieving mother and of a tyrannical father who took over her upbringing her escape from her loveless home into books and the unorthodox and influential male and female role models to which her reading exposed her murray also covers fuller's authorship of *woman in the nineteenth century* her career as a new york tribune journalist first in new york and later in rome her pregnancy out of wedlock her witness of the fall of rome in 1849 during the roman revolution and her return to the land of her birth where she knew she would be received as an outcast other biographies call fuller a romantic margaret fuller wandering pilgrim illustrates how fuller internalized the lives of the heroes and heroines in the ancient and modern romantic literature that she had read as a child and adolescent as well as how she used her romantic imagination to broaden women's roles in *woman in the nineteenth century* even as she wandered the earth in search of a home

in *dreams of the burning child* david lee miller explores the uncanny persistence of filial sacrifice as a motif in english literature and its classical and biblical antecedents he combines strikingly original reinterpretations of the *aeneid* *hamlet* *the winter tale* and *dombey and son* with perceptive accounts of dreams found in memoirs poems and psychoanalytic texts miller looks closely at the grisly fantasy of the sacrifice of sons as it is depicted in classical epic early modern drama the nineteenth century novel the postcolonial novel the lyric the funeral elegy sacred scriptures and psychoanalytic theory he also draws examples from painting sculpture photography and architecture into a witty and engaging discussion that ranges from the binding of isaac to chinua achebe's *things fall apart* and from questions of literary history to the dilemmas of patriarchal masculinity

this work represents a novel treatment of the mission of the church fathers the early christian ascetics and their disciples during the turbulent centuries that followed the passing of the apostles approaching a normally arcane subject largely through the interplay of character and incident outreach and renewal provides a stirring account of the various ways in which spiritual leaders of the time promoted the gospel message readers experience these leaders as they illuminate strengthen restore or defend the faith through their words and actions of fellow christians facilitating fresh

insights and thought provoking conclusions the theme proceeds through the interaction of a varied cast of vital individuals engaged in lively and sometimes acerbic discourse which is always aimed at the glory of god with the careful attention the author gives to the early irish church and its singular representatives this work is a unique and valuable contribution to the study of the patristic era

in the 17th century harmonious sounds were thought to represent the well ordered body of the obedient subject and by extension the well ordered state conversely discordant unpleasant music represented both those who caused disorder murderers drunkards witches traitors and those who suffered from bodily disorders melancholics madmen and madwomen while these theoretical correspondences seem straightforward in theatrical practice the musical portrayals of disorderly characters were multivalent and often ambiguous o let us howle some heavy note focuses on the various ways that theatrical music represented disorderly subjects those who presented either a direct or metaphorical threat to the health of the english kingdom in 17th century england using theater music to examine narratives of social history winkler demonstrates how music reinscribed and often resisted conservative political religious gender and social ideologies

taking the culturally resonant motif of the descent to the underworld as his guiding thread david l pike traces the interplay between myth and history in medieval and modernist literature passage through hell suggests new approaches to the practice of comparative literature and a possible escape from the current morass of competing critical schools and ideologies pike s readings of louis ferdinand céline and walter benjamin reveal the tensions at work in the modern appropriation of structures derived from ancient and medieval descents his book shows how these structures were redefined in modernism and persist in contemporary critical practice in order to recover the historical corpus of modernism he asserts it is necessary to acknowledge the attraction that medieval forms and motifs held for modernist literature and theory by pairing the writings of the postwar german dramatist and novelist peter weiss with dante s commedia and christine de pizan with virginia woolf pike argues for a new level of complexity in the relation between medieval and modern poetics pike s supple and persuasive reading of the commedia resituates that text within the contradictions of medieval tradition he contends that the dantean allegory of conversion altered to suit the exigencies of modernism maintains its hold over current literature and theory the postwar writers pike treats weiss seamus heaney and derek walcott exemplify alternate strategies for negotiating the legacy of modernism the passage through hell emerges as a way

of disentangling images of the past from their interpretation in the present

recursive desire rereads the epic tradition and specific epic poems in ways that challenge traditional notions of the genre and highlights its vital shifting polyvocal array and disarray of textual forces

the roman empire has been a source of inspiration and a model for imitation for western empires practically since the moment rome fell yet as julia hell shows in the conquest of ruins what has had the strongest grip on aspiring imperial imaginations isn't that empire's glory but its fall and the haunting monuments left in its wake hell examines centuries of european empire building from charles v in the sixteenth century and napoleon's campaigns of the late seventeenth and early eighteenth centuries to the atrocities of mussolini and the third reich in the 1930s and 40s and sees a similar fascination with recreating the roman past in the contemporary image in every case particularly that of the nazi regime the ruins of rome seem to represent a mystery to be solved how could an empire so powerful be brought so low hell argues that this fascination with the ruins of greatness expresses a need on the part of would be conquerors to find something to ward off a similar demise for their particular empire

is there a specificity to adapting a roman play to the screen this volume interrogates the ways directors and actors have filmed and performed the shakespearean works known as the roman plays which are in chronological order of writing titus andronicus julius caesar antony and cleopatra and coriolanus in the variety of plays and story lines common questions nevertheless arise is there such a thing as filmic romanness by exploring the different ways in which the roman plays are reinterpreted in the light of roman history film history and the shakespearean tradition the papers in this volume all take part in the ceaseless investigation of what the plays keep saying not only about our vision of the past but also about our perception of the present

classical memories is an intervention into the field of adaptation studies taking the example of classical reception to show that adaptation is a process that can be driven by and produce intertextual memories i see classical memories as a memory driven type of adaptation that draws on and reproduces schematic and otherwise de-contextualised conceptions of antiquity and its cultural exports in broadly speaking the twentieth and twenty first centuries these memory driven adaptations differ often in significant ways from more traditional adaptations that seek to either continue or deconstruct a long running tradition that can be traced back to antiquity as well as its canonical points of reception in later ages when investigating such a popular and widespread set of narratives characters and images like those that remain of graeco roman antiquity terms like adaptation and reception could

and should be nuanced further to allow us to understand the complex interactions between modern works and classical antiquity in more detail particularly when it pertains to postcolonial or post digital classical reception in classical memories i propose that understanding certain types of adaptations as intertextual memories allows us to do just that

epic does many things among others it defines the nature of the human storyteller recalls the creation of the world and of the human race describes the paradoxical role of the hero as both the everyman and the radical exception and establishes the complex quest underlying all human action epic illustrates that these ingredients of epic storytelling are universal cultural elements in existence across multiple remote geographical locations historical eras ethnic and linguistic groups and levels of technological and economic development frederick turner argues that epic despite being scoffed at and neglected for over sixty years is the most fundamental and important of all literary forms and thereby deserves serious critical attention it is the source and origin of all other literature the frame within which any story is possible the mission of this book is to repair gaps in the literary understanding of epic studies and offer permission to future epic writers and composers the cultural genres of marvel comics gothic anime manga multi user dungeon gaming and superhero movies reprise all the epic themes and motifs consider the wizard of oz star wars the lord of the rings lost the matrix superman harry potter and narnia here can be found the epic beast man the miraculous birth of the hero the creation myth the founding of the city the quest journey the descent into the land of the dead the monsters and the trickster this book will be of interest to all readers fascinated by folklore oral tradition religious studies anthropology mythology and enthusiastic about literature in general

this book examines the ways that classical and renaissance epic poems often work against their expressed moral and political values it combines a formal and tropological analysis that stresses difference and disjunction with a political analysis of the epic's figurative economy it offers an interpretation of three epic poems homer's iliad virgil's aeneid and spencer's faerie queene that focuses on the way these texts make apparent the aesthetic moral and political difference that constitutes them and sketches in conclusion two alternative resolutions of such division in milton's paradise lost and cervantes don quixote an epic in prose the book outlines a theory of how and why epic narrative may be said to subvert certain of its constitutive claims while articulating a cultural argument of which it becomes the contradictory paradigm the author focuses on the aesthetic and ideological

work accomplished by poetic figure in these narratives and understands ideology as a figurative substitutive system that resembles and uses the system of tropes she defines the ideological function of tropes in narrative and the often contradictory way in which narratives acknowledge and seek to efface the transformative functions of ideology beginning with what it describes as a dual tendency within the epic simile toward metaphor in the transformations of ideology toward metonymy as it maintains a structure of difference the book defines the politics of the simile in epic narrative and identifies metalepsis as the defining trope of ideology it demonstrates the political and poetic costs of the structural reliance of allegorical narrative on catachresis and shows how the narrator's use of prosopopoeia to assert political authority reshapes the figurative economy of the epic the book is particularly innovative in being the first to apply to the epic the set of questions posed by the linking of the theory of rhetoric and the theory of ideology it argues that historical pressures on a text are often best seen as a dialectic in which ideology shapes poetic process while poetry counters resists figures or generates the tropes of ideology itself
